Criteria	Narrative	Score
Number and breath of relevant policy	In South Korea, 14 national policies have been identified that incorporate strategies, action plans, legislation and guidance geared towards promoting physical activity for the children and adolescents with disabilities in South Korea.	4/10
Identified supporting actions	These policies emerge within, and are implemented across, three governmental domains including Ministry of culture, sports and tourism, ministry of education, and ministry of health and welfare. All 14 policies have identifiable actions related to physical activity.	20/20
Identified accountable organization(s)	All 14 policies have identified 'lead' organizations, which are to support and take responsibility for some of the identified physical activity policies and provisions.	25/25
Identifiable reporting structures	All 14 South Korean policies have identified some form of monitoring and reporting on their various policies and related actions.	15/15
Identified funding/resourcing (national programs)	All 14 policies have identified funding to support their identified actions and directly providing evidence of already allocated or dedicated provisions. As part of the government's commitment to providing and promoting physical activity in South Korea, it has supported a number of national programs designed to increase physical activity among children and adolescents with disabilities. The RWG identified nine of these programs as evidence of national 'resources' geared towards increasing physical activity outcomes, whereby each programs can be seen as a physical activity opportunity for children, or a promotional initiative to encourage future physical activity among this population	20/20
Monitoring and evaluation plan	All 14 policies articulated an evaluation and monitoring plan. It is worth noting that of the various types of policy (e.g. legislation, strategy, action plan, guidance) that the Research Working Group identified for this indicator, all of the 'Action Plans' outlined monitoring and evaluation strategies. Perhaps this is because action plans are time bound and generally tied to specific measurable objectives or targets and thus easier to evaluate, whereas governmental legislation is on-going and tends to remain broad in scope	10/10
